

Every year on the Sunday following Easter, we get to hear about good old St. Thomas - the one who wasn't there when Jesus appeared to the disciples. Thomas was the one who needed proof of Jesus' Resurrection. For years I would preach about doubt and how it is part of the life of every believer. Today, however, I would like to focus on one aspect of the story we may have overlooked. How did Thomas recognize the Risen Lord?

He did so by placing his fingers in Jesus' hands and his hand in Jesus' side. In other words, he recognized Jesus in His brokenness and woundedness.

My dear friends, all of us are wounded. All of us are banged up from time to time. The person whose marriage is on the rocks; the person who has just been axed from his or her job; someone who just moved to a nursing home; a person angry with God because of their cancer; kids being teased at school; someone struggling with addiction and certainly each of us is banged up by our selfishness and sin.

That is why today's Gospel is a great one for the Feast of Divine Mercy which we celebrate today. On February 22, 1031, Jesus appeared to St. Faustina in her convent in Poland. He was clothed in a white garment. One hand was raised in blessing, the other touched his heart from which came two rays. Jesus instructed her to paint an image and place a sign beneath it which reads: "In Jesus I Trust." That picture hangs above our tabernacle. Jesus appeared to her with the simple message: "God's love and mercy are greater than any sin."

I hope none of us doubts that truth. I hope none of us is afraid of God. God has been talking to us throughout our lives about His mercy and forgiveness. Never be afraid of God. Look at the Cross. That is how much we are loved. Look at the Divine Mercy picture and embrace the words: "In Jesus I Trust." Bring your troubles to God as well as your joys. God's mercy is unending.

As Thomas embraced the Lord and believed, may you and I accept God's mercy and come alive.

WEEKLY SCRIPTURES & THOUGHTS For the Parish Family of Saint Christine



THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER APRIL 15, 2018

Reading

Acts 3:13-15, 17-19

Peter addresses the people describing the death of Jesus. God raised Jesus from the dead, fulfilling prophesies from the Old Testament. What does Peter then say to them, giving them hope? Is he saying this to us? Peter said to the people:

"The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our fathers, has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and denied in Pilate's presence when he had decided to release him. You denied the Holy and Righteous One and asked that a murderer be released to you. The author of life you put to death, but God raised him from the dead; of this we are witnesses. Now I know, brothers, that you acted out of ignorance, just as your leaders did; but God has thus brought to fulfillment what he had announced beforehand through the mouth of all the prophets, that his Christ would suffer. Repent, therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be wiped away."

Psalm Ps 4:2, 4, 7-8, 9

David prophesied what happened to the apostles shortly after Jesus' death. In distress, they are gathered together praying for God's help. What's next? R. Lord, let your face shine on us.

When I call, answer me, O my just God, you who relieve me when I am in distress; have pity on me, and hear my prayer! R. **Lord, let your face shine on us.** Know that the LORD does wonders for his faithful one; the LORD will hear me when I call upon him.

R. Lord, let your face shine on us.

O LORD, let the light of your countenance shine upon us! You put gladness into my heart.

R. Lord, let your face shine on us.

As soon as I lie down, I fall peacefully asleep, for you alone, O LORD, bring security to my dwelling. R. Lord, let your face shine on us.

<u>Reading</u> <u>1 Jn 2:1-5a</u>

The author recognizes that even though we try not to sin, we do. He tells us that Jesus died for the expiation for our sins, the sins of the whole world. What is necessary to receive forgiveness?

My children, I am writing this to you so that you may not commit sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous one. He is expiation for our sins,

and not for our sins only but for those of the whole world. The way we may be sure that we know him is to keep his commandments. Those who say, "I know him," but do not keep his commandments are liars, and the truth is not in them. But whoever keeps his word, the love of God is truly perfected in him.

Alleluia Lk 24:32

R. Alleluia, alleluia.

Lord Jesus, open the Scriptures to us; make our hearts burn while you speak to us.

<u>Gospel</u> <u>Lk 24:35-48</u>

At the gathering of the apostles, Jesus appears. Although they were startled and terrified, Jesus recalled both in the old testament and his teachings, that He would rise. Why do you suppose He asked for food? The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread. While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have." And as he said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, He asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?"They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them. He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled."Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. And he said to them, "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

Some Thoughts: I remember times when I was a youngster when I went on camping trips. One of the favorite activities on those trips was sitting around a campfire at night and telling ghost stories. Even though I kept telling myself, "There is no such thing as a ghost," that didn't keep some of those stories from scaring the daylights out of me, and they often made it difficult for me to go to sleep that night. Now, that might seem like a strange way to begin a Bible lesson, but even in Bible times, some people believed in ghosts and were afraid of them. Today's Bible lesson is one example of that. The story begins after two men had walked along a road to a place called Emmaus. They were discussing the crucifixion of Jesus and all of the events that had taken place in the past few days. They wondered what it all meant. As they walked, they were joined by a man on their walk. They did not recognize that the man was Jesus.

There is much more to that part of the story, but it is enough for now that we know that Jesus revealed himself to them. Finally, they recognized that the man was Jesus. They were so excited to see that Jesus was alive that they jumped up and walked all the way back to Jerusalem. The two men found Jesus' disciples and began telling them what they had seen. The Bible tells us that as they said these things, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be to you." Do you think the disciples felt peace? No! The Bible says that they were terrified and filled with fear, thinking that they had seen a ghost! Once again Jesus spoke to his disciples. "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands. Look at my feet. You can see that it's really me. Touch me and make sure that I am not a ghost, because ghosts don't have bodies, as you see that I do." Still the disciples stood in disbelief, so Jesus asked them, "Do you have anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of fish, and he ate it as they watched. That was even further proof that they were not seeing a ghost. A ghost doesn't need food. The disciples had seen Jesus die. They had seen him placed in a tomb. But now they saw Jesus alive. Not just this day, but for more than 40 days, they saw him and talked with him. They even watched him eat food. They were not seeing a ghost! Those same disciples went all over the world, telling the story of Jesus' crucifixion, his death, and his resurrection. They never stopped telling the story during their whole lives.

You and I have been called to tell the story just like those disciples. We must be a witness for Jesus, too. We must tell the world that Jesus is alive.


